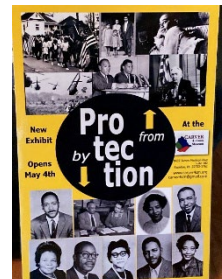

Carver Regional High School existed and thrived from 1948 to 1968, through four U.S. presidencies and six Virginia governorships. Of the six governors, only one was not a segregationist.
